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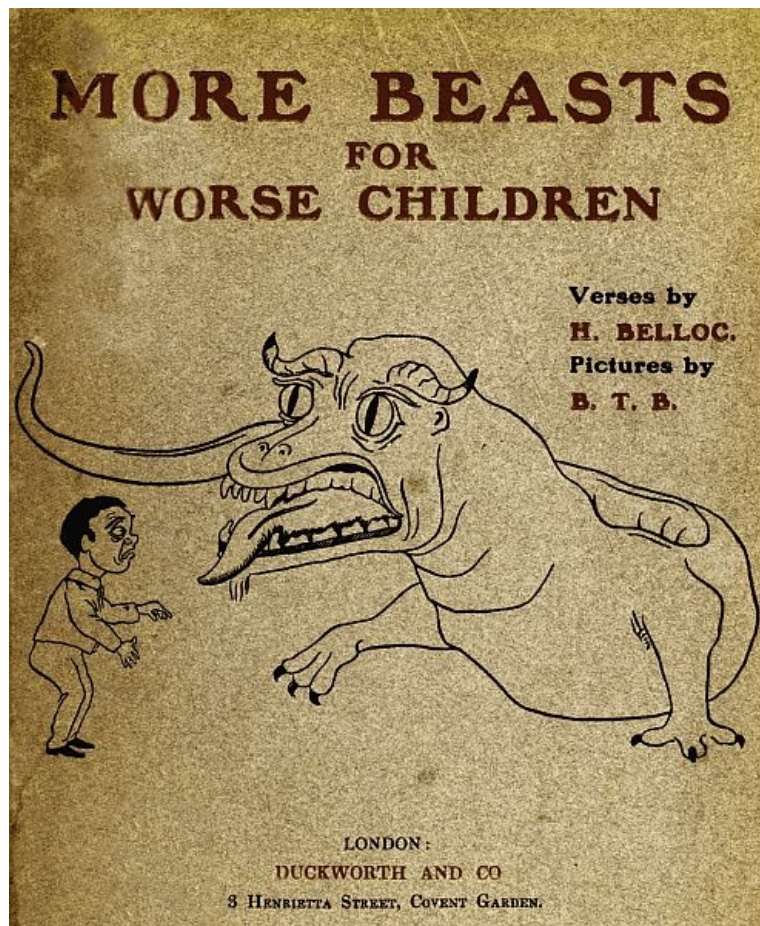

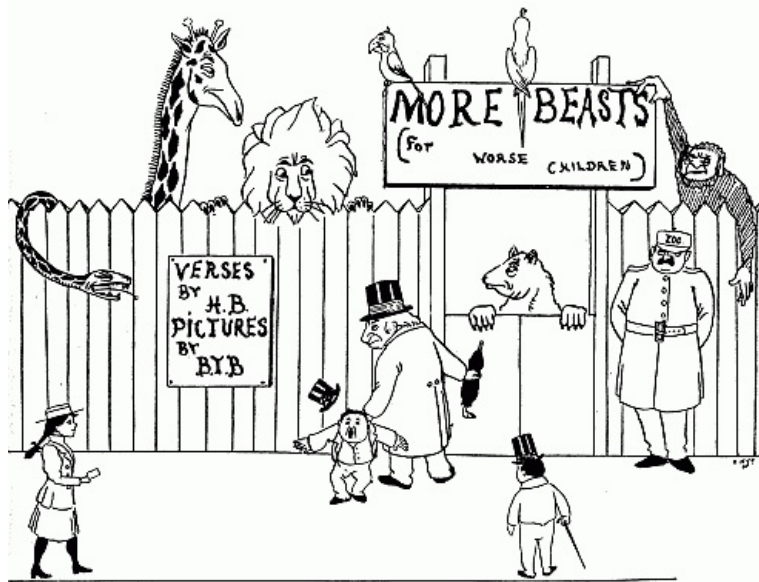

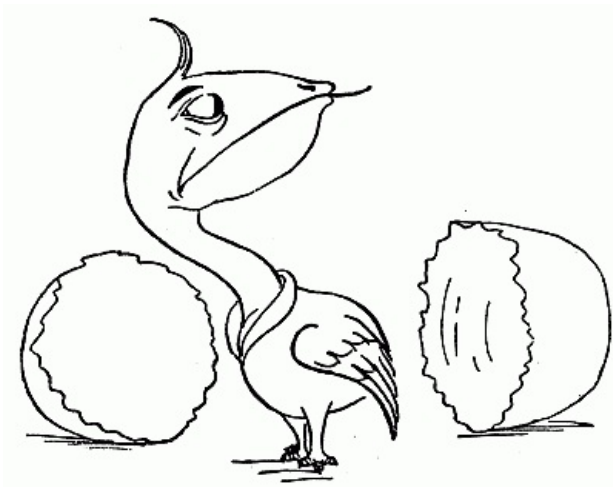

And wondering, asked each other:

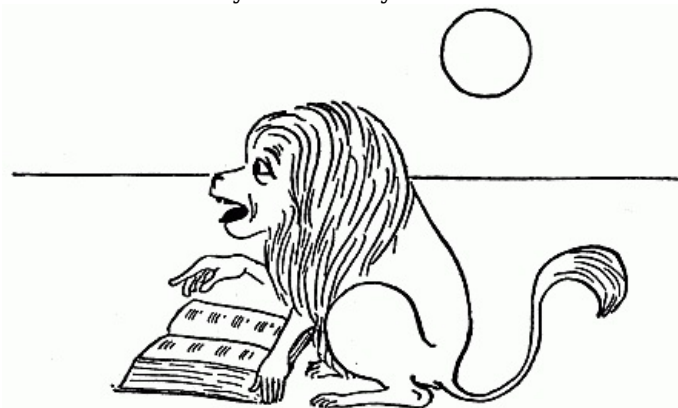

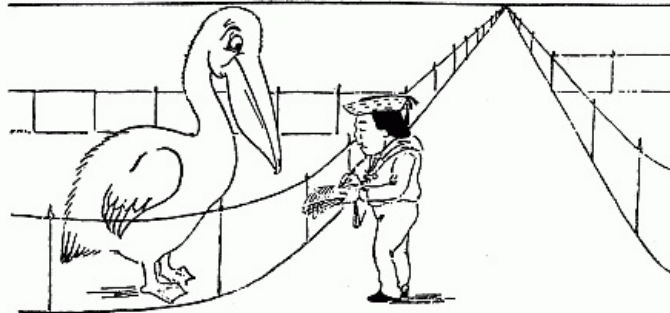
To answer why the Guinea-pig

Who is extremely wise."



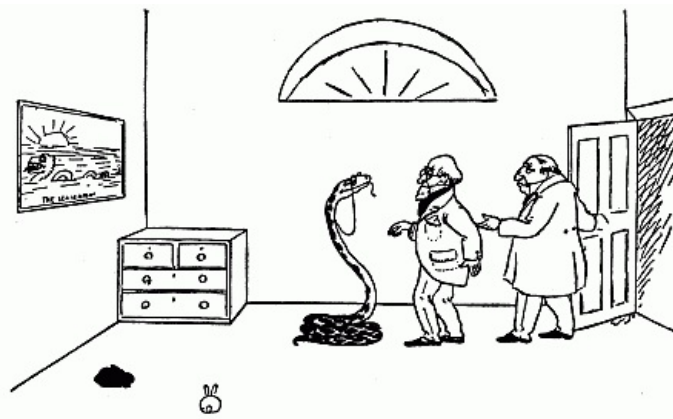

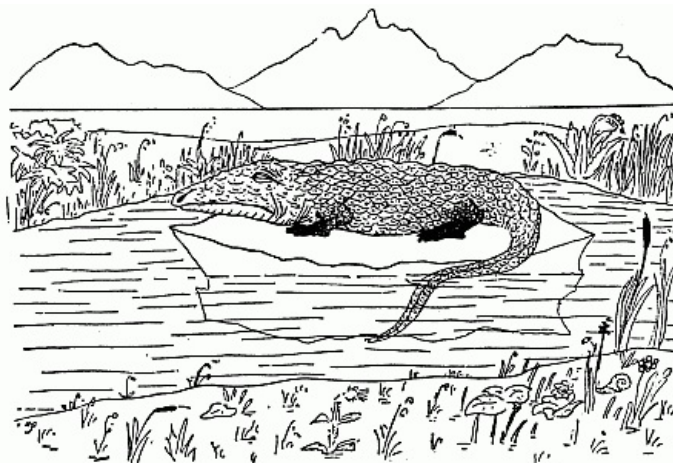
The Scorpion

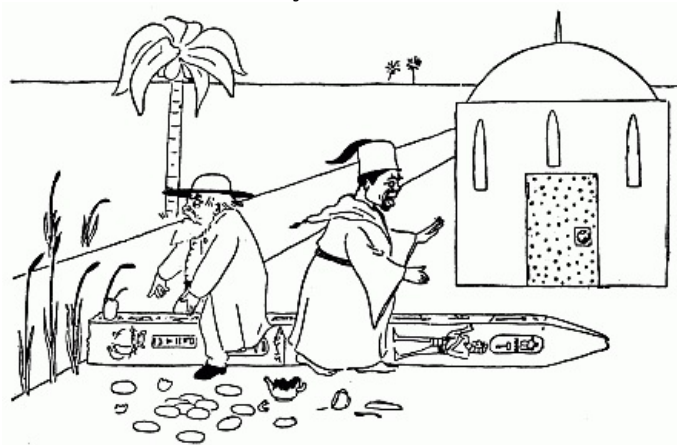


And oft in some far Coptic town

Why does he start and leap amain,

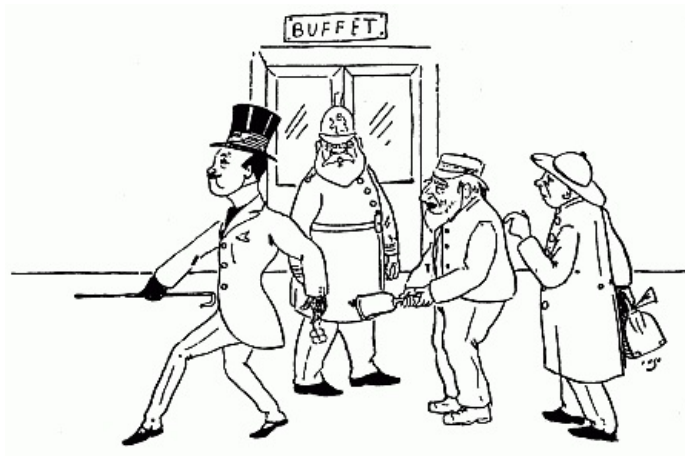

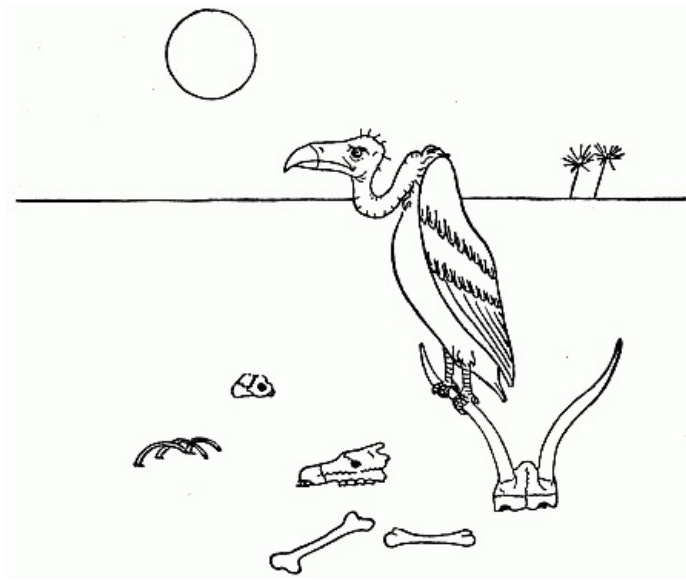

To only eat at dinner!

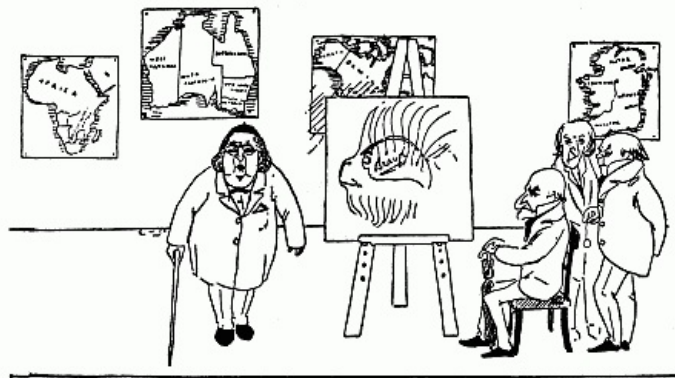

The Bison



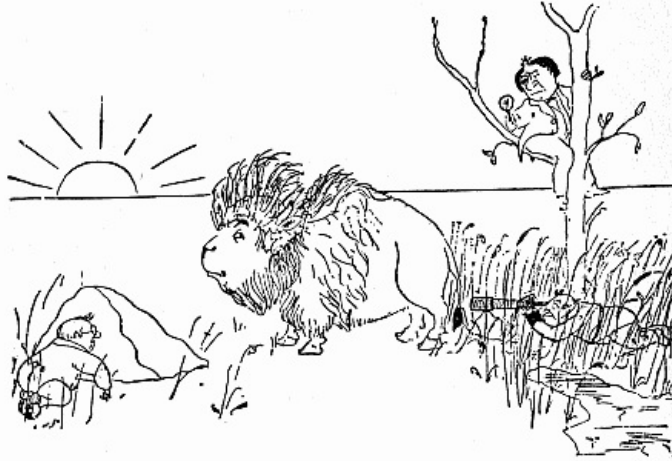
The Bison is vain, and (I write it with pain)

The opulent growth of a genius' brain;

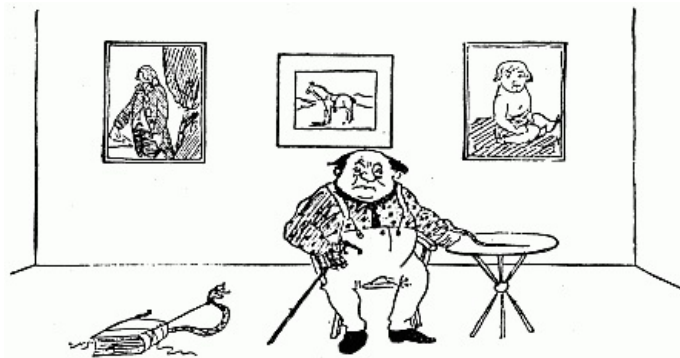

With the *first* you are only the worse for a fright,

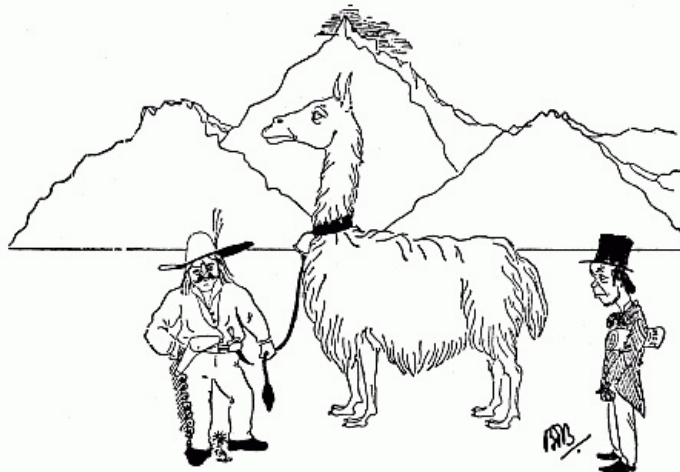

And I know the place he lives in (or at least—I think I do)

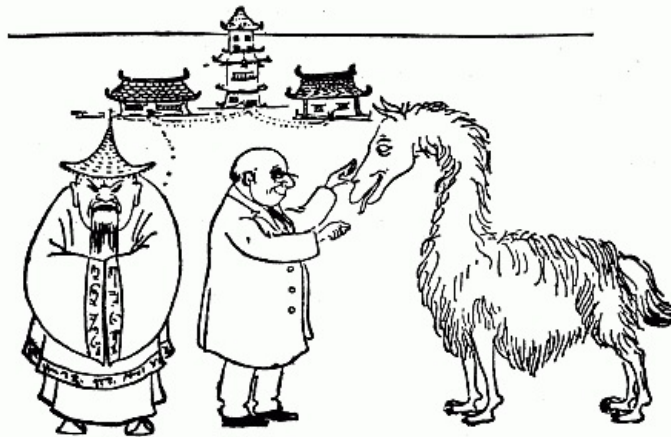
It is Ecuador, Brazil or Chili—possibly Peru;

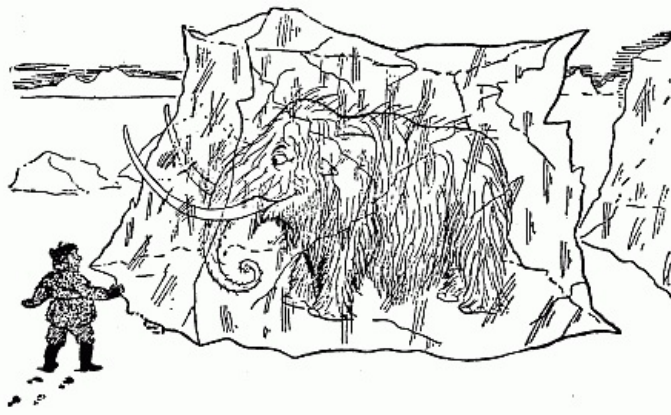
The Chamois

The dainty is nearly unknown.

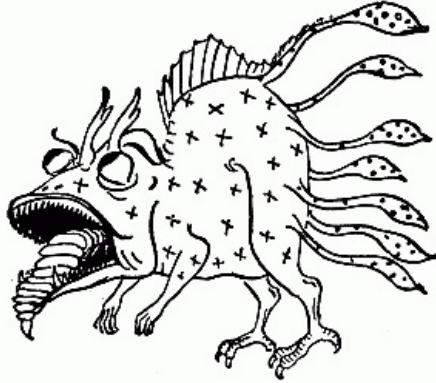
